## Lecturer | Department of Family Practice

The Midwifery Program within the Department of Family Practice at The University of British Columbia (UBC) invites applications for a Full Time Lecturer. This appointment will be for a three (3) year term with the possibility of extension.

The Department of Family Practice is dedicated to improving the health of the people of British Columbia. The Department provides leadership to stimulate and facilitate academic and community-based research and education that addresses the needs of communities. Our large complement of over 3,500 academic, clinical, and adjunct faculty members provides exceptional opportunities for partnerships and mentoring within the Department as well as a wide range of scholarly and interdisciplinary opportunities across the Faculty of Medicine and other UBC departments. Faculty members within the Department of Family Practice conduct research that spans a wide scope from aboriginal peoples' health to prevention of chronic disease to social epidemiology, midwifery and maternal care, health services, systems and policy research.

The Internationally Educated Midwives Bridging Program (IEMBP) aims to increase diversity and expertise within the midwifery workforce in British Columbia. The eight month training program provides a means by which internationally trained midwives can become registered for practice within B.C.

Reporting to the Midwifery Program Director through to the Department Head, the successful candidate will teach and oversee the operational needs of the IEMBP. Specifically, the individual will work with tenure and tenure track faculty to ensure the curriculum is current and relevant, directly teach in the program as well as ensure all teaching roles are filled by clinical faculty, academic faculty or guest lecturers. The successful candidate will provide student evaluations, oversee the student clinical placements process, lead the student admissions process and assist in marketing the program to international midwives.

The successful candidate will have a degree or a master degree in Midwifery, be a practicing midwife in British Columbia and also be in good standing with the BC College of Midwives and preferred training as a midwife outside of Canada. The successful candidate must also have a minimum of three (3) years' experience in post-secondary teaching, have excellent communication skills, a track record of excellence in teaching, and evidence of and commitment to innovative teaching methods and curriculum development. Previous teaching experience in medical education is preferred.

Salary will be commensurate with qualifications and experience. A letter of application outlining the applicant's research and teaching interests, accompanied by a detailed curriculum vitae and the names of three references should be directed to:
